Originally developed by Allan Savory, Holistic Management, is a multi-step process that provides a framework for making decisions.

Using the example of a puzzle, **Steve Riggins** of Cambridge, Iowa, explains that "all the different pieces of what you're doing on the farm have to fit together. All the puzzle pieces have to fit together for the same picture, rather than three different puzzles that you're working on for three different pictures."

<u>In 2017</u> and <u>again in 2018</u>, six farmers compared lettuce varieties to find which ones could help them meet this challenge.
