Meet a Co-Hort: Dean Henry

Dean and Judy Henry established the Berry Patch Farm in the early 1970s. With their son Mike, they produce a wide variety of perennial berries, tree fruit, and pumpkins. Berry Patch produce is available at markets, through local CSAs, and on the farm through u-pick or picked to order.

Something you're excited to try this year:

Day-neutral strawberries. We've always tried different methods of growing strawberries. Some work in our climate and some don't. We had a terrible experience with day-neutral strawberries 20 years ago, but we're going to try again. There are 2 or 3 new varieties, and we're going to try growing them on plastic this year.

Something you would change about your industry:

I've always been kinda critical of people who mislead the public about the product they produce being perfect and being raised perfectly, but [in reality] the grower



is really at the mercy of the environment. The industrialization of horticulture is a real threat to the home grower and the small farmer.

The social time at the dinners at the PFI annual conference and meeting other people in our type of farming, who share the things you like to do and think about.

IN THE FIELD

Snapdragon variety trial

Jill Beebout and Anna Hankins & Shae Pesek selected three snapdragon varieties and evaluated their performance during 2021 in terms of marketable stems produced for inclusion in bouquets.

The objective of this project was to determine, by farm, which of three snapdragon varieties produced the



most number of marketable stems for cut-flower production.

Sweet potato enterprise budgets: What are the costs and returns of this popular CSA crop?











From this information, we calculated net income. Each farm planted and managed sweet potatoes according to their own timing, markets and preferred practices, which are detailed in this research report.

Annual wildflower and herb mix for pollinators



Jill Beebout, Alice McGary, Rob Faux and Sarah Foltz Jordan assessed flower establishment and attractiveness to insects on their farms in 2017.

Four diversified vegetable farms planted strips of an annual flower mix.

Annual wildflower and herb plantings are an easy and inexpensive way to rapidly increase the amount of forage for bees and other beneficial insects on farms.
