McKinley Lain and his partner, **Casey Lewis,** operate Cooper Field Farm near Centerville, lowa, where they grow diverse vegetables and pumpkins that they sell through farmers markets and on-farm sales.

Why do you grow hort crops, in 5 words or fewer? Feed community & the soil.

What is something you're excited about trying this year? We are testing four different bed prep methods to compare costs, benefits and risks of each for different crops. We are trying black landscape fabric with drip tape, hay mulch, cardboard mulch and traditional tilled beds.

What is one thing you would change about your industry (no limits)? Oh, there are so many ways to go with that question! I want to decentralize production and increase consumer awareness about - and farmers' ability to grow – local food.



Favorite PFI memory: At the 2020 PFI Conference, I made some really powerful connections with amazing folks like Nicole Masters and Tommy Hexter. The networking opportunities through PFI are so incredible.

Your favorite crop and why? Dried beans! The diversity of beans is continually impressive. I can connect to a lot of cultural points through beans, which is fun. Plus, they're easy to store and eat over the winter.
