Natasha Hegmann farms with her husband, **Pete Kerns**, at Turkey River Farm near Elkader, Iowa, where they raise produce for markets and CSAs. They also operate a greenhouse for bedding and vegetable plants. Natasha is the senior horticulture viability coordinator for PFI.

Why do you grow horticulture crops, in five words or less: It was an accident!

What is something you're excited about this year: For the first time since we started farming in 2015, we have decided to not grow fall crops this year. We have a small growing space and have always had a big focus on successions of crops. So we're not focusing on starting new plants right now, and scaling back in that small way is a good fit with my off-farm job.

What is one thing you would change about your industry? I wish vegetable farmers didn't have to work so hard to make their farm businesses viable and that there were economic forces that make fresh, local food the easy choice. For instance, what if we taxed imports on vegetable products from outside the state of Iowa.

Favorite PFI memory: Swimming in the unheated pool with our toddler at the hotel during the Cooperators' Meeting around 2022.

Your favorite crop and why: Sweet peppers, because they are abundance personified in a crop. When peppers are in season, I feel like the richest person in the world. Plus, they are my favorite thing to snack on; a sun-warm Carmen pepper is the best!

A global view of season extension



Every now and then, horticulture growers need to zoom out – way out. Researchers at the University of Copenhagen recently shared satellite imagery that they used along with artificial intelligence tools to map greenhouses across the planet. The resulting estimates triple all previous numbers.
